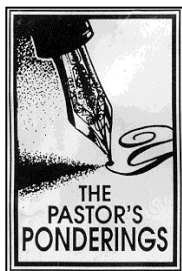

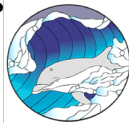

### A Note from Lynne Coates

On February 25, Fr. John, my son Thom, and I traveled to Bruton Parish in Williamsburg for my postulancy interview. I had hoped to be granted postulancy so that I could continue my path to the priesthood. It was not to be. Our present Bishop is requiring those of us who are in local seminary formation to attend a regular seminary, such as Virginia Theological Seminary, at least a year. He is also requiring upcoming priests to have the flexibility to be deployed to wherever they are needed in the diocese. With my responsibilities at home, I can do neither. So, although they discerned from me a strong call to ministry, they could not grant postulancy. The others in my local seminary class have the ability to go to VTS and to be sent anywhere in the diocese, so they are going forward, and they will all make wonderful priests. As you can understand, I am said, and grief for the loss of this call comes in waves. I am discerning now where God is calling me. The very good news for me is that I will stay at Emmanuel. I know that if I am faithful to my spiritual disciplines, God will make of this loss something good. Thank you for keeping me in your prayers.

### Scholarships Available

The Episcopal Church Women of the Diocese of Southern Virginia are offering scholarship aid to men and women for continuing education. These scholarships are only available to Episcopalians living the Diocese of Southern Virginia. The deadline for applying is July 1, 2010. There are two scholarships:

\* The Elise Holladay Scholarship was established by the ECW as a memorial to Elise Holladay, an early president of the ECW of the Diocese of Southern Virginia. It provides assistance to men and women for continued education beyond high school in **undergraduate study only**. Scholarships are dependent on funds and will be no larger than \$500.

\* The Tucker Memorial Scholarship was established in 1925 by the ECW as a memorial to the late Beverley Dandridge Tucker, Bishop of Southern Virginia from 1906-1930. It provides assistance to men and women in church-related training in an accredited Episcopal Church training school. One half of the Tucker scholarship must be repaid within five (5) years.

Applications for these scholarships are available in the church office.

### Faith Works Coalition (FWC) News

FWC has commenced the planning for a wonderful joint project with Judea Christian Outreach Center. JCOC owns a duplex that they rent out to low income folks as part of their affordable housing ministry. The duplex is badly in need of renovation and modernization. Faith Works Coalition will take the lead on the renovation. Volunteers from JCOC and FWC will be working together.

Scheduled work days will be every Thursday, Friday, and Saturday beginning Thursday March 18 with a target completion date of April 17. During the first phase, March 18, 19, and 20, we will be removing cabinets and fixtures and making floor, wall, and ceiling repairs.

There is no building skills needed to help out with this very worthwhile project, but we need a lot of willing helpers. If you would like to sign up or like more information, please contact your Faith Works Coalition representative.

# A Letter from Roger Hungerford to Bishop Hollerith

February 26, 2010

Dear Bishop Hollerith,

Itminan (Peace in Urdu which I learned from a visiting Pakistani seminarian).

I am almost half way through my second semester. My academic workload remains heavy and diverse causing study time to fly. This semester I have covered a lot of material from the Pentateuch, to theology, to missiology. I am particularly drawn to my liturgy class and my ethics class – Church and Politics. My heart leads my formational focus to center on how we praise God and how we bring God's healing spirit into the world. The Holy Spirit has enlightened me, and Christ has carried me through all of my classroom studies. Due to space I am going to focus on one unique transformational part of my education – the January Encuentro, and touch upon a missionary experience.

From January 4th through the 20th I participated in a cross cultural immersion along the U.S.-Mexican border. The class provided a familiarization with regional history to gain understanding before going to the area and viewing reality. I was amazed how much the Spanish explorers, the Carilla, and the Mestizos had colonized the area prior to the arrival of Anglo settlers in the early 1800s. We learned of the social and political forces that changed the area in the middle and late 1800s. The Mexican heritage with the regional family ties across the border remains a huge part of the fabric of the border region. When we traveled to and crossed the border, I saw firsthand the incredible economic disparity between the U.S. and Mexico. There are large "colonias" which are populated by people living in little more than shanties built from pallets – some have electricity; very few have water or sewer so sanitation is a challenge. I easily saw how God has blessed America, but it raised two questions. Where is God's blessing across the Rio Grande? Are we, Americans, to be a light for the world and be the blessing? Speaking of the Rio Grande, at Eagle Pass-Piedras Negras (the location of our studies), the river is only about 75 yards wide. Most of it is only about knee deep, but there is a channel about 20 yards wide that is over a person's head. So the stage is set – an economically depressed area looking over a thin river to a flourishing region.

So who are the actors in the ongoing immigration drama? I learned that most of the people who attempt to cross without going through immigration come from Central America which is even more economically depressed than the border region. Most are men desperately trying to provide for their families who travel thousands of miles and are willing to cross a life threateningly cold river just to get to the other side to work minimum wage jobs. Once across, immigrants share rooms to pool expenses and send a lot of their meager wages home. Trying to melt in, they obtain as much documentation as they can. Employers, complying with our law, withhold taxes and social security. According to the Social Security Administration, "illegal" immigrants pay in \$7 billion in payroll taxes from which they will not see any benefit. Imagine the amount of work done to earn the minimum wage pay needed to generate that amount of taxes. According to *The American Journal of Public Health* due to the fact that immigrants are hiding their status, they have a tendency not to seek medical treatment. Because they have no insurance, they primarily use a pay as you go process for most of their care. Some myths I carried have been debunked. While going through this experience I reflected on 1 Timothy 6:17- 19.

The Anglican Church is in the midst of all of this disparity and desperation. Sunday services are lively and filled with hope. The churches are small, but beautiful. They have multiple large murals depicting Biblical scenes on their walls. The music is uplifting and sung very loud. Smiles, hugs and handshakes abound at the passing of the peace. Despite the language barrier, I was able to follow along

and marveled at hearing and seeing all the components of the Divine Service in another language in a unique setting. This view imparted a sense of connectedness and provided a wonder filled glimpse of the "one holy catholic and apostolic church" that gathers worldwide each Sunday. I now have a deeper sense of what it means to be part of the Anglican Communion.

I also had the opportunity to view the Episcopal Church's activities helping and ministering to the poor in Laredo, TX. Despite efforts, there exists a separateness between established (and in a lot of cases floundering) Anglo congregations and growing Latino congregations.

I know after having experienced my encuentro I have been transformed, and realize once again, much more clearly that there is no "us and them." We are all God's children and we all make up the body of Christ. I am praying as to how this transformation will be reflected in my ministry upon my return home after graduation. Somehow, our church is going to have to live fully into the opening paragraph of the Preface on page 9 to the BCP and realize we are one congregation and adapt accordingly.

Liz and I also had the opportunity through Emmanuel, Virginia Beach to go on a mission trip to the Holy Cross Anglican School in Belize where we worked on the buildings, helped in the library and tutored. I was honored as a seminarian to lead Morning Prayer on Thursday for close to 500 students. There were three services broken down by age group so I modified a presentation on the Parable of the Sower for each group. We closed each service by having our missionary team make a grateful noise by singing "This is the Day." The kids joined us and it was beautiful, AND THEN the children sang the song to us in Spanish, "Kriol" (Belizean Creole) and Garifuna. Our whole team was overwhelmed by their singing. We felt the Holy Spirit hug each of us as we listened.

I also was privileged to spend time with a local high school student – Michael Howe. The Emmanuel men's Cursillo Group to which I belong, sponsors Michael so he can continue his education beyond Holy Cross Anglican School, our equivalent of Middle School. It was nice to meet someone for whom we only had a name, and to see how our contributions are helping to change the world just a little bit. Michael is participating in a unique after school program that could lead to his becoming a fire fighter. Michael invited Liz and me to his church – a Pentecostal Church – to see him in a youth group presentation. There is no Anglican Church in San Pedro. Michael's church ministers to the poor Spanish speaking Belizean community. Most of the members are in construction building the expensive condos used by tourists. Liz and I thought we would sit in the back of the church and watch Michael perform, but the Pastor had other ideas. Liz and I were seated in a place of honor up front. I was asked to speak to the congregation about our mission group and offer words of encouragement to the youth. Once again I was awed by the joy filled presence of God among the poor.

In closing, rest assured that I will continue my diligent studies to honor God's calling and complete my formation for ministry. When I reach a stress point I will turn to God in prayer and embrace my wonderful wife, who embodies Christ and lovingly encourages and cares for me. I hope that one day you will be able to visit SSW, and I will happily share more detail on my formation. Win will corroborate the wonder of this seminary and the area. Until our paths cross...
